



un Valley it is not, and that's the way Aaron Paul likes it. In this Idaho village on the shores of a pristine glacial lake, there's no Allen & Company conference, no symphony, no arts center, no Hemingway pilgrims, and no traffic. The attractions here appeal more to trekkers than jetsetters: whitewater rafting, hot springs, skiing, and restaurants that skew toward cheese-

burgers, fries, and huckleberry ice cream. Aside from Paul—
the award-winning actor, who will appear in the new season
of Westworld this month and is lauded for his roles in Big
Love, BoJack Horseman, and, most famously, Breaking Bad—
the biggest local celebrity is a mythical lake creature à la the
Loch Ness monster (which Paul says is most likely a landlocked sturgeon). For the 40-year-old native Idahoan, the area
is imbued with nostalgia. His grandparents owned an A-frame
nearby. And whenever he makes the two-and-a-half-hour drive
from Boise Airport (after an easy two-hour flight from LAX),
Paul says, "it takes me right back to my childhood—lying in the
back seat and staring up at the trees, covered in snow."

Since he has visited his entire life, it's no shocker that Paul would choose to build here, creating a rustic yet refined escape from Los Angeles for himself, his wife, Lauren, who cofounded the Kind Campaign, and their two-year-old daughter, Story. "Tm just a psycho when it comes to looking for property," Paul says, detailing the exhaustive search that ultimately led to five wooded acres bordered on two sides by the banks of a snaking river. He and his wife would build their mountain dream pad from scratch, calling in Pearson Design Group, out of Bozeman, Montana, to create the log-clad, cabin-style home and the Los Angeles-based Jake Arnold, who has a client list that includes Rashida Jones and Julianne Hough, for the interiors.

old British-born designer chose to pare it down, creating a lighter, European-inflected feeling while retaining the essential brawny character of the place. Throughout the five-bedroom house, which is full of bespoke pieces (often executed by local artisans), hand-hewn craft is tempered by chic design, frontier spirit by urban cool. In the dining room, a planked trestle table sits beneath a constellation of ceramic pendant lights by Natalie Page for BDDW. ("When Jake presented those lights," Paul says, "I was like, 'This is perfect.'") The guest-bath vanity is fashioned out of reclaimed Wisconsin barnwood, a material found throughout the house, including the raftered ceilings of the living room. The sauna is sheathed in local cedar that. Paul says, came from "this giant tree that had just been pulled out of one of the lakes here." And perhaps most striking is the omnipresence of Montana moss rock, a notable example being the 13-ton hearthstone in the living room. Paul, a self-described architecture and design obsessive, made sure to be on-site the day the colossal stone arrived. "I never thought I'd get so excited about rocks," he said. "I found myself daydreaming about rocks."

THE PAULS' IDAHO HIDEAWAY may be the essence of a frontier cabin, but there's no compromise with comfort, considering the heated concrete floors, light-filtering curtains, and an abundance of textiles, particularly linen, which Arnold-whom Paul calls "a brilliant artist"-deployed in the spirit of unfussy elegance. And just in case the couple ever get a case of cabin fever, the house provides its own escape from elemental wood and stone. The downstairs lounge-bar, billiards, theatertransports them and their guests 5,000 miles away to an oldschool London club on Pall Mall. (When Arnold staged the reveal for Aaron and Lauren, he situated two women dressed as flappers at the bar, nonchalantly sipping cocktails.) With its gleaming paneling, amber lighting, and William Morris touches, it's more P. G. Wodehouse than Old West, the perfect place for a tipple-which, for Paul, tends to be mezcal from Dos Hombres, the company he founded with his Breaking Bad costar, Bryan Cranston.

Arnold is an expert at creating crepuscular rooms that are soothing refuges: They're womblike, never tomblike. "So many spaces are overlit," he says. When it came to lighting, Paul says, Arnold was the perfect ally in achieving what he wanted: "Moody, beautiful, sexy."

Paul calls the house Camp Pretty Bird, inspired by the pet name he uses for his wife. Its rhythms are camplike, dictated by the seasons. In winter, they might play in the snow with Story or, as Paul likes to do, go for ice-cold plunges: "I tend to spend a lot of my day lying in the freezing river." Come summer, there might be tubing on the river, or a foraging party might be arranged for berry picking. The property is popular among deer and bear families. "They're friendly neighbors!" Paul says. His and Lauren's own family gatherings can hit the double digits in terms of guests. Camp Pretty Bird can easily accommodate them-and surely will for years to come.

"I poured my heart and soul into this thing, as did Jake Arnold and Pearson," Paul says. "I was pulling my hair out a lot during the process, but living in a place that you built is a dream come true." And the dreamiest part of it is that, for Paul, the house is all about the joys of family and escape. "I lose my phone for weeks on end," he says, "and take myself just . . . away. It's beautiful." ...
